

EDITORS' NOTES

I forwarded the idea of quarterly meetings at the University of Louisville to generate more interest in the society. Activities at these meetings may include

curation of the U of L collection, speakers, workshops on particular taxa or techniques, identification of your specimens, etc.

The meeting generated much discussion on a variety of options open to us. These will all be touched upon in a survey which will be included with the next issue. If you have items or suggestions for the survey, or would like to help with its preparation, please contact me.

REPORT OF THE 17th ANNUAL MEETING by Charles V. Covell, Jr.

The 1990 Annual Meeting of the Society began with two lectures by our special guest, Dr. Lincoln P. Brower, of the University of Florida. The first was Thursday evening, Nov. 15, and drew 65 people, who heard him speak about "The Grand Saga of the Monarch Butterfly." On Friday afternoon he spoke to the Biology Department seminar group on "Annual Dynamics of Chemical in the Milkweed Plant/Monarch Butterfly/Avian Predator System." That evening over 30 people attended the annual open house at the Covells'.

Saturday morning saw the group gather at the Entomology Lab in the Life Sciences Building at the University of Louisville. The collection of over 100,000 Lepidoptera was open for inspection; and many members worked on identifications, renewing or forming acquaintances, and looking at collections brough. The tasty Heitzman doughnuts were in plenteous supply.

At 1:30 President Christa Anderson chaired the annual business meeting. Secretary/Treasurer Covell reported \$326.53 in the treasury after costs of printing and mailing 2 newsletter issues and \$295 outlay for our new T shirts (see announcement of

availability elsewhere). Donations to the Identification Fund were generous in the past year, with a total of \$404 given, \$216 of which had been disbursed to pay for 77 identifications by Dr. W.E. Miller at Univ. of Minnesota. Barry Nichols, Editor, renewed his plea for contributions of articles great and small so we can fill the last issue of Vol. 16 of the Kentucky Lepidopterist. club field trips were reported by Richard Henderson, although several of us had gotten together for collecting in Kentucky during the year (including 2 groups making July 4th Butterfly Counts for the Xerces Society). Elections were held, with the following results: Roger Zebold, President, Charlie Covell, Sec./Treas.; Barry Nichols, Editor of Kentucky Lepidopterist; and Jim Bess, Program Coordinator (known formerly as Field followed Discussion Coordinator). regarding the mission and activities of the Society. Mike McInnis urged a return to the original purpose: to discover as fully as Kentucky's possible the extent of Lepidoptera fauna. Barry Nichols suggested monthly or quarterly meetings to work on the collection, Louisville techniques, and do other things. Other ideas for activities include exchange of photos of Lepidoptera among members, a trip to Day Butterfly Center at Callaway Gardens, GA; to embrace the club changing name to "Kentucky entomology (and the Entomological Society" or such); asking to address our group additional speakers (several good prospects were suggested); a articles on various Lepidoptera series of families in newsletters; hands-on experiences for youth (including training for county 4-H entomology exhibits); activity as merit badge counselors for the Boys Scouts; high school availability of expertise to science program coordinators; and relationships with other Kentucky nature organizations. All agreed that the focus on the state Lepidoptera focus should continue, the book on Lepidoptera of even though Kentucky is now about ready to publish (it is being formatted in a MacIntosh computer for camera-ready copy soon to be sent Kentucky Nature Preserves Commission).

After a short recess, Dr. Lincoln P. "BIOLOGICAL Brower gave his feature talk, RATIONAL FOR URGENCY IN CONSERVING MONARCH BUTTERFLY MIGRATION CYCLE IN NORTH AMERICA." The conservation of the phenomenon of this unique migration is imperative, and Brower presented evidence of the fragility of the roosting sites in Mexico, and problems in keeping the roosting forest sites free from woodcutting, smoke, and other 80,000 visitors saw these Over hazards. sites in 1989-90, and local Mexicans have not vet learned to utilize tourism logistics as an income source alternate to slash-and-burn farming, timber and charcoal production from the trees, and other destructive practices. He fears the sites will eventually become unsuited to overwintering of monarchs, and that the great migrations will largely be extinct. Thus, the possible extinction of a phenomenon - the migrations and roosting After discussion of Dr. Brower's shorter presentations included "THE DEFENCES OF TIGER MOTHS (OR HOW TO LIVE WITH PREDATORS) by Dr. James K. Adams, Daltor College, GA; "COLLECTING IN IRIAN JAYA, INDONESIA, 1990" by C.V. Covell Jr.; "A NEW TRAP DESIGN" by George Balogh, Portage, MI; a slide presentation on Lepidoptera on stamps and show-and-tell Vince Lucas; presentations by scouts of Troop 1, Paducah, adjourned after We and others. drawing at about traditional door prize 5:30, and about 14 of the group dined together at Masterson's Restaurant near the campus.
